BONANE Community Co-op Society is a perfect example of forward thinking when it comes to showcasing the ancient heritage and antiquity of a locality. The Bonane Heritage Park is one of the most appealing landscapes in the Beara Peninsula, boasting some of the most fascinating examples of archaeological heritage in the county.

But the genesis of this project is owed to the community spirit of Bonane Community Co-op Society, which was formed in 2002.

The group was set up with the aim of acquiring land from Coillte that would become a precursor to the heritage park. The group was able to purchase 37 acres of land on which visitors today can view stone circles, fulacht fiadh, examples of rock art, and a ring fort, to name a few.

Danny O'Connor of the Community Co-op Society said that without the help of people from Tús schemes, the park would not be

maintained to the standard it is. When one considers that over 7.000 visitors a year pass through the park, this work is all the more vital.

"We couldn't do without RSS and Tús participants. They do so much in the community from helping older people to keeping localities looking good. Bonane Community Co-op Society has around 140 members and we're proud of what we've achieved in this beautiful

Preserving heritage and antiquity in Comane/Glenbeigh

THE Comane/Glenbeigh Holy Well proje is a significant indicator of a comm working in unison to preserve its tradition and antiquity. St Finian's Well has enjoyed a celebrated existence in the community for centuries, but its thanks to this group's understanding of the past that the well's future is now secure.

In 2012 a committee was formed to revive the holy well as it had become overgrown and inaccessible to the public. Through a combination of community schemes under the remit of SKDP, man power and funds were put in place to set about restoring the well. In subsequent years a grotto and pathway have been added to reach the well. while a car park has also been provided.

Committee member Sean Roche explained that without the permission of local andowners and the intervention of SKDP the project would not have been possible
